Tony's Steak and Tavern, in the same building as the popular Tony's Mountain Pizza, is now ready to deliver to your table an eye-popping, mouth-watering steak expertly cut and done perfectly to your individual specification. Thick as you desire, carefully grilled by highly trained and experienced Chefs, these culinary delicacies are marbled marvels of excellent cuisine.

It really all began almost ten years ago when Sam and Carol Hepp decided to venture into the food service industry by buying the building and business that is now Tony's Pizza. Sam provided the day-to-day physical handy work in the building and Carol was the heart and spirit of the enterprise. Together, they and their daughter Jill, built the brand with the now familiar logo in Custer and surrounding counties; Tony's Mountain Pizza. It was a successful enterprise by all measures with an upward trajectory into the future. Then life happened and with the loss of Carol, Sam and the Hepp family decided it was time to move on.

After almost a decade of successful

operations serving the community, the business was for sale sometime in 2022.

Attracted by the beauty of Wet Mountain Valley and the majestic, iconic Sangre de Cristo Mountain range, Johnny Winton bought a lovely home in Happy Valley about four years ago and moved from Miami, Florida. So it was not surprising in the least that at some point Johnny's entrepreneurial interest would be piqued, a conversation exchanged and, against all advice, he and his partners bought the business.

Originally from Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he was born and raised until, at the age of twentyone, he moved to the Scottsdale/ Tempe area in Arizona to take a job in the medical field where he rose to management positions over a period of twelve years. But Johnny is a visionary type who felt he could achieve more in his lifetime. And so, he moved to Miami where he focused on commercial real estate. His timing was perfect. 

July 17 BOCC: Fire Suppression Ponds, Day Gets His Big Grant, One Finance Director Applicant, CC Claybusters Shot Down

The Custer County Board of County Commissioners regular weeklymeeting on July 17, 2024 started at 9 a.m. in their throne room across from the county courthouse. All three commissioners were present: Bill Canda, Lucas Epp and Kevin Day.

In New Business, Day announced that his primary project during his entire 3.5 year stint as commissioner was coming to fruition as he has obtained tax money in the form of a grant from the grant machine, the Upper Arkansas Area Council of Governments to buy playground equipment "for the children" in Wetmore. However, this grift money needs county matching funds so we are all on the hook for half of

Budget Resolution 24-17 was next. Our Veterans Service Office honcho. Dominic Edginton requested a loan of \$5k to "kickstart" a \$50k grant he is getting for our Veterans. This will be repaid as soon as the grant money is received. This passed.

A big presentation by various people including state and local offices was next concerning establishing three "fire suppression ponds" on the valley floor. The locations are at/near the Beckwith Ranch, the Rusk Ranch and the "Coleman Pond". As with anything concerning water and the State of Colorado, it was a long and complicated presentation with a ton of red tape and bureaucrat nonsense needed to get it done. It was decided that the players involved would proceed with the attempt.

Epp was next with a proposal to combine two county positions, Maintenance and Custodial, into one job. He noted that the Maintenance contract with an outside contractor is expiring soon and we have an opportunity to streamline things a bit. Epp estimated that the two jobs would take around 50 hours per week and that a full-time person and a part-time person could handle the job. The rate would be \$22.50 per hour.

In Additional Items of Business, Epp said we have only received one application for the Finance Director's job and that was sent to the screening committee for review. (This is after months of advertising all over the state and country. The problem is the





salary is way too low and the commissioners don't have the cajoles to raise it because it would be way higher than any other county official.)

Epp then said the six-month budget review will be next Wednesday (July 24) at the SAR building.

In <u>Public Comments</u>, Jerry Tracewell from the Custer County Claybusters Club (a local club that teaches clay and trapshooting to our kids and they also go to competitions) made a statement that all the equipment that they have at the Sheriff's Office shooting range came from donations, mostly from the Friends of the NRA. He said rumors that the school paid for anything are false.

Then the real subject came up when Day told Tracewell that the club can only use the range during the school year as the school has insurance for the training. Once the school year ends, Day said "you are not welcome" as the club, apparently, has no other insurance. Day said it was a county owned range, on county property and the club has no Memorandum of Understanding with the county and they "have no insurance in place". This set Tracewell off as he and a bunch of volunteers have spent a huge amount of time and effort in getting the club going and this would end the effort for the kids to learn and compete. Tracewell said, "I have put hundreds of hours into this. You have wiped it out." And that is how it ended.

And that was that. Another day in Happy Valley.

Hanme Clark Preliminary Hearing: Judge Finds Sufficient Evidence for Trial in Triple Homicide



11 th Judicial District Judge Lynette Wenner, after hearing testimony from various witnesses, including Custer County Sheriff Rich Smith, found that there was sufficient evidence to proceed to trial on six felony counts, three of which are for first degree murder. (A first-degree murder charge can carry a penalty to life imprisonment without any chance of parole.)

The hearing was held on Wednesday, July 24th, at the Custer County Courthouse.

The charges allege that Clark killed three people just off of County Road 255 (Oak Creek Grade) over a property dispute. Those killed were: Rob Geers, Beth Wade and James Daulton. They all died via gunshot wounds.

The arraignment hearing is scheduled for September. Clark remains in the Pueblo County Jail on \$2,000,000



bond. During the hearing, Clark's attorney wanted bond reduced but that was denied.

Local Arrested on Felony Charges

This morning (Editor/GG: 7/24/24) at approximately 8:15 AM the CCSO was notified of a disturbance at Dollar General Store. Deputies arrived and contacted the suspect. The suspect fled in his own car, a silver Pontiac Trans Am, sideswiped a deputy vehicle and drove northbound on H69. Deputies followed a

few blocks and terminated the pursuit.

The vehicle continued northbound on H69 at very high speed. A short time later the suspect returned to his home on Lea Lane in Westcliffe. Deputies attempted to talk him out of the home. An ambulance was staged nearby and a crisis intervention negotiator contacted the suspect by telephone. The suspect refused to exit the home. CCSO contacted our

psychologist for input on the strategy to end the barricade peacefully.

The suspect later exited the home at approximately 10:37 without incident.

The suspect was identified as Derek Ming of Westcliffe. Derek Ming is facing charges of felony vehicular eluding and other charges.

There were no injuries. There was minor damage to the deputies vehicle.

Algae at DeWeese

WESTCLIFFE, Colo. - A growing bloom of toxic blue-green algae at DeWeese Reservoir State Wildlife Area prompted Colorado Parks and Wildlife to warn the public to avoid contact with the water.

"Algae has become a seasonal problem at DeWeese, forcing CPW to close the water in recent summers to all activity except fishing to prevent the risk of exposure to humans and their pets," said CPW District Wildlife Manager Justin Krall. "The algae can be harmful to people and pets if touched. It can give sensitive people a bad rash, for example. And it's possibly fatal if ingested."

Signs are posted at the reservoir by

water and explaining the danger of the algae blooms.

The warning was prompted after testing found dangerous levels of toxicity in the water and elevated levels of algae were observed in a turquoise-colored film on the reservoir.

"You can still fish during an algae bloom," Krall said. "But there should be no skin-to-water contact.

"It's also important to take care when handling and cleaning any fish caught in DeWeese. Toxins accumulate in the liver and guts of fish. So it's important that any fish taken is properly cleaned and thoroughly cooked before eating it."

Algae blooms are common when temperatures rise, usually in late CPW warning visitors to avoid the summer, he said. CPW has been

monitoring the reservoir closely, taking weekly water samples to check for elevated toxicity.

Algae are an important part of aquatic food webs, but some types of bluegreen algae are capable of producing toxins that may cause negative health impacts for humans and pets at elevated concentrations. Currently there is no method to remove toxins from lakes.

The Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) recommends the following:

Keep kids out, No pets in water. Do not drink water, Avoid contact with algae. If exposed, shower immediately



Sumatran Orangutan

I think you are going to really enjoy this week's topic. We will be talking about the Sumatran Orangutan. The pictures of this animal are gorgeous. Let's get started.

The Sumatran orangutan (Pongo abelii) is one of the three species of orangutans. Critically endangered and found only in the north of the Indonesian island of Sumatra. They are restricted to the northern tip of the island. They primarily live in lowland tropical forests, including mangrove, riparian forests and swamp forests. Sumatran orangutans can be distinguished by their lighter, orange-colored hair and long facial hair compared to the other two orangutan species.

Their diets tend to be frugivorous, meaning they thrive mostly on raw fruits or succulent fruit-like produce of plants such as roots, shoots, nuts and seeds. Preferred fruits include figs and jackfruits.

It will also eat bird eggs and small vertebrates. They are highly intelligent animals. They are the most intelligent of the great apes, they recognize themselves in a mirror and they have been seen using tools. Scientists have even taught them communication skills, such as human sign language and the use of computer touch-screens. They will break off a tree branch about a foot long, snap off the twigs and fray one end with its teeth. They will then use this tool to dig holes in trees looking for termites. They also will use this tool to poke a hole in a bee's nest wall to catch the honey.

They lead solitary lives and they move slowly during the day through the trees in search of food. Half a mile a day is the most they usually travel. They are not very territorial and they share their home ranges with others.

They mate mostly during the rainy season, December to May. They have a nine-month gestation period after which the female will give birth to a single infant. The mother has built a new nest high in a tree for her infant. They may be weaned by the age of three. They generally stay with the mother till the age of eight or nine. During this time, they are taught special forest survival skills.

According to the IUCN Red List, the total Sumatran orangutan population is around 7,300 individuals. Their numbers are decreasing and they are classified as critically endangered on the list of threatened species.

Man Arrested After Drive-By Shooting Results in Vehicle Pursuit

Press Release Cañon City Police Department

Heroic efforts by Cañon City Police officers to end a dangerous police pursuit resulted in the arrest of Andrew Seymour (34), of Cañon City, after Seymour allegedly committed a drive-by shooting in the 2100 block of Central Ave. at approximately 3 p.m. July 24. Seymour, who is currently on parole, was arrested on the following charges:


- Criminal Attempt to commit Assault in the First Degree (Class 4 Felony)
- Illegal Discharge of a Firearm (Class 5 Felony)
- Menacing (Class 5 Felony)
- 18-12-108 (1),(2) Possession of Weapons by Previous Offenders (Class 5 Felony)
- 18-5-105 Criminal Possession of a Forged Instrument (Class 6 Felony)
- 18-4-501(1),(4)(c) Criminal Mischief (Class 1 Misdemeanor)
- 18-3-208 Reckless Endangerment (Class 2 Misdemeanor)
- 18-18-403.5 Unlawful Possession of a Controlled Substance (Class 1 Drug Misdemeanor)

On July 24 at approximately 3 p.m. officers were dispatched to the 2100 block of Central Avenue on reports of shots fired. When

officers arrived on scene, they discovered evidence that led them to believe that multiple shots were fired at a house and vehicle in that location.

Officers quickly went to work, collecting statements and evidence and were able to develop information on a possible suspect. Working with the Cañon City Police Department Crime Analyst, and in collaboration with the Colorado Department of Corrections parole office, officers were able to gather intelligence regarding the location of the suspect, identified as Seymour.

Following up on that information, officers were able to locate Seymour, who was driving a vehicle that matched the description of a vehicle that was last seen leaving the area of the shooting. Officers attempted to make a traffic stop which resulted in Seymour attempting to flee in the vehicle. After a brief vehicle pursuit, the officers saw an opportunity to execute a vehicle pursuit intervention technique and safely pushed and pinned the vehicle between a telephone pole and two CCPD patrol vehicles, effectively disabling the operation of the vehicle and ending the pursuit. Seymour was taken into custody with no injuries and was booked at the Fremont County Jail on the charges listed above. It should also be noted that a subsequent search of the vehicle yielded the discovery of a semi-automatic handgun that is believed




to have been used in the shooting, as well as a small amount of suspected Fentanyl and MDMA.

Chief Schick stated, "The efforts by the officers to conduct this maneuver to safely end a dangerous vehicle pursuit before the vehicle could be driven into more populated areas of the city, during the mid-afternoon hours, coupled with the fact that the driver was suspected of committing a violent felony act with a firearm and not knowing if the suspect was still armed, was nothing short of heroic and both officers are to be commended for their action. Further, the ability of our officers to funnel real-time information to a crime analyst, who was able to filter information through intelligence communities and outside law enforcement partners, was a direct reason why this incident was handled in such a timely manner."

Because of their efforts, a dangerous felon is now off the streets and will be required to answer for the chaos caused on July 24. Seymour is presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.



in the judges' booth: a raised shed sponsored by Beach Redi-Mix and Tony's Mountain Pizza.

"I told you, he should've extended his legs." The old boy next to me demonstrates by holding out his arms at 45-degree angles, palms facing the ground. "Spurs in.

Prompted by his accent, I ask. He left West Texas for Westcliffe last year and is now retired.

A volunteer rodeo sage, then.

Prompted by my accent, he asks. I explain.

"No kidding."

"None at all."

He takes his pedagogical duties more seriously now. "W'lemme let you go with this: The Wet Mountain Valley Stampede's really summin'. The professionals tomorrow'll get you stirred up as all get-out."

This is a professional sport, but it was a profession before it became a sport. Plaid-collar jobs can still be had at these altitudes. You can estimate how prosperous a nation has grown by how much of its agriculture has been repackaged as leisure and recreation. The primary-totertiary industrial crossover. It pays well. Livestock can sustain only so many: a couple of thousand between Westcliffe and her conjoined twin, Silver Cliff. (The two share a Main Street.) It's three or four times that from Memorial Day to Labor Day. Appreciable numbers for a town whose Broadway is gravel.

At the Rancher's Roost, a staid diner in a bowling alley, I hear a herd of cowboys saunter in: clack-clack, clack-clack. Bootheels and hats add height, gravity. Next to them, at the register to settle the bill, I look like the representative of an early primate in Gifford's diagram of human evolution, theirs being the fully upright stage. I check my posture. The first night of the rodeo is for them: the ranchers. These are their workhorses and this their lifework. Filial franchises, often. Perhaps it's the only way an event so cinegenic can avoid celebrity. All I can tell about Roper No. 31 — who could be 31 or 13; Stetson pulled over the eyes, shirtsleeves billowing, an androgynous silhouette is that he has immense forearm strength, which is all I can tell about any of them. The names don't help make distinctions: Talon, Cash, Shade, Jayce, Jase, Blaze. Not a single Philip. Not one Hector, breaker of horses: That's nominative determinism debunked.

The second night's the real deal. Here are the professional, rather than vocational, cowboys. The merger of agribusiness and entertainment is consummated. The opening acts require crowd participation. Mutton-bustin' is no ring-around-the-rosie, but it's a children's game (six and under). Look at little Kelsey go: She emerges from Bucking Chute 3 (sponsored by Yoder's Home Furnishings), sheepborne, upside down somehow, eyes flickering like electrical charges in a cloud. It's a game. Much as Late Bronze Age Minoan bullsomersaulting was probably a game. Much as hog-tying cattle and the rest of it is not. No, in the main, the rodeo is an exhibition of an ancient human art: the subjection of nonhuman species. A battle of wills and flexor tendons. Cowboys demonstrate homesteading skill. The community isn't celebrating sporting ability. It's celebrating itself — its existence. (The Minoans didn't make it.)

The rules for team roping are inscrutable, but you don't mind. Quadrupeds scatter. One calf lies on the thick dirt and declares it should like not to be disturbed. A horseman casts a confident lasso at a runner. Sling and a miss. It catches a hind shank and the tail. The animal is anchored but won't say uncle. It prances, tripodal, to the beat of the main riff of "Money for Nothing." Another fella dismounts and steers the steer to the ground by the horns. He fetches a branding iron (unheated). Tag. You're it. Bob Edmonds announces various integers. "Three, fourteen, ten!" He's excited. Then, "One, fifty-three, twenty-six!" The cryptic ramblings of a seer. Nobody cares. I don't remember from which state the winning team is. There are no breakaway-roping or barrel-racing drafts, no NCAA scholarships or shoe deals. This is bigger than a sport; the arena has no room for "personalities."

The periphery is a different story. Joining the audience is a teenager with a moppy mullet and a T-shirt that reads "Easily distracted by t*ts and tacos." One could've gathered as much. From the opposite direction totters a stylish granny escorted by what looks like Sam Elliott's mustache saddled on a different man's face. Two disposable vapes roll out of a woman's kangaroo pocket as she labors up the grandstand. Her kid retrieves them. Descending the stand is an Amish girl in a blue cape dress and a bonnet, followed by Miss Stampede herself: high-school royalty with a sash to prove it. I look for the newspapermen in the crowd. The 50thmost-populous county in Colorado (out of 64) has two of them. Jordan Hedberg edits what he says, and his rival disputes, is the nonpartisan Wet Mountain Tribune. George Gramlich edits what he says, and everybody agrees, is the openly partisan Sangre de Cristo Sentinel. Both were business studs long before they decided to make the regional press profitable again. Gramlich seems to believe that a man like Donald Trump comes about only roughly once per century. Hedberg agrees, I imagine, but he's comfortable with that frequency. Many locals subscribe to both papers. Custer County is real-life Mayberry.

In the contestants' section, a woman in a shimmering jumpsuit tends to three palominos. I ask for their names. Mojo, Cowboy, and Vanilla. (The woman is Bethany.) They're about to perform something called "three-up Roman riding." Bonam fortunam. I later find out that she's one half of a championship-winning, trick-riding, trick-roping, whip-cracking, fire-taming, gun-spinning husband-andwife act. The feat she mentioned looks like charioteering without a chariot. She starts with two engines. Then adds Vanilla. Even Achilles amid an Anatolian siege was content to be chauffeured by just two steeds (though one could talk, and both were godly). Romans are gaudy. There's a modern monoculture, of course: Little Americas everywhere. You can find baseball in Johannesburg, flag football in Jakarta. But then there's this. Where else will you get the whole jamboree? Mild hypoxia — the Wet Mountain Valley is a mile-and-a-half-high trip — elevates the spectacle.

And the provisions. The provisions! Once in my boyhood I ate caramel-covered popcorn out of a white bucket with Old Glory printed on it. It's a good time to reenact the memory. I ask for the largest bag available (who says city folk don't get their hands dirty at work?). No Stars and

Familiarity breeds contempt— and children.

Stripes on this packaging, but the label says "Don't poke the bear" — it's the same message. Now, the deep-fried corn dog: that thing I would feed to Mojo if I could be convinced it didn't contain horse meat. I toss it and try a "tater twister." Pairs well with a Banquet. (Tribute to the Coors Brewing Company — which celebrated its centennial three years before the Centennial State did — is piously paid.) Late on the first night, I'll end up at the town's historic feedstore. A Second Street fixture since the late 1800s. Its fare now has been adjusted to human tastes. You can park by the hitching post. Its old storage basement serves as a speakeasy for a clique of Mennonite kids, but not tonight. I'll ask Jessa, a young artist, where the crowds are. At the only other spot open past 8 p.m.: the Silverdome Saloon & Music Hall. A large globular thing on a blasted heath. It looks like a signals-intelligence-gathering and radar station. But it has a full bar. All roads lead to Dome.

Bull-riding serves no pastoral purpose; working ranchers have no reason to attempt it. It's the second night's headline performance by the pros. A lad from the Wyoming town of Thermopolis scores 83 points atop a brute for whose mug natural selection has disclaimed responsibility.

"Holy cow, am I right?"

I turn around.

"Was lookin' for you. Did you see him extend his legs?" The Texan sage is back, arms outstretched with approval. "Spurs *in*."


I ask whether he was a rancher. He talks about how he met a lady at last night's rodeo and, this morning, helped her brand 63 cattle. All right. "I used to be a rodeo clown," he confesses. I tell him he shouldn't be so hard on himself. No he explains — his job in the arena was to distract bulls from downed riders. "Bulls ain't like 'orses. They'll be fixin' to trample ya, sit on ya, gore ya!" Now he regularly sends Colorado-grade THC products to an old colleague whose rear end has met too many bovine front ends: The man would turn his back on bulls and goad them to launch him into the ionosphere. Different strokes . . . My sensei shuffles off with promises of beer and a reunion. I never catch his name.

How are the email-pushing proles supposed to go about their own business after watching these guys and gals make such a festival out of theirs? Host a Prezi party? Plan a family trip to Las Vegas to catch the finals of the Microsoft Excel World Championship? "Work-life balance" is bunk. When the two aren't the same, you've neither. I decide to look into the Dome. It's a dive and a sports bar and a beer garden and a swing-dance hall and a pool parlor and a music venue and a pizza joint and a karaoke lounge. (Why not also a signals-intelligence-gathering and radar station?) A patron croons with a handsome rasp. "What a Wonderful World." Easy for you to say. You don't have to spend two hours on I-25 tomorrow. A Ute with a long braid, black as the dark sacred night, buys drinks for his pals. He asks if I'll have one. Will I have one? I'll have one. Wild horses couldn't drag me away.

Radical Roots & Communist Ties

Kamala Devi Harris was born to an Indian mother and a Jamaican father in Oakland, California on October 20, 1964. She is, in part, a descendant of a Jamaican slave owner, as Harris' father, Donald J. Harris, explained in a January 2019 essay which he wrote about his family's heritage:

"My roots go back, within my lifetime, to my paternal grandmother Miss Chrishy (née Christiana Brown, descendant of Hamilton Brown who is on record as plantation and slave owner and founder of Brown's Town) and to my maternal grandmother Miss Iris (née Iris Finegan, farmer and educator, from Aenon Town and Inverness, ancestry unknown to me). The Harris name comes from my paternal grandfather Joseph Alexander Harris, land-owner and agricultural 'produce' exporter (mostly pimento or all-spice), who

died in 1939 one year after I was born and is buried in the church yard of the magnificent Anglican Church which Hamilton Brown built in Brown's Town (and where, as a child, I learned the catechism, was baptized and confirmed, and served as an acolyte)."

Harris' mother, Shyamala Gopalan Harris, was an internationally famous cancer researcher and the daughter of P.V. Gopalan, a high-ranking Indian diplomat from the Brahmin caste. As a Los Angeles Times article described Shyamala, she was the "privileged child of foreign grad students." She taught at universities in France, Italy and Canada, and she once told Modern Luxury magazine: "When Kamala was in first grade one of her teachers said to me, 'You know, your child has a great imagination. Every time we talk about someplace in the world she says, Oh, I've been there. So I told her [the teacher], 'Well, she has been there!' India, England, the Caribbean, Africa—she had been there." Modern Luxury also quoted "one of Harris's Nob Hill friends" as saying that "her Brahmin background accounts for her ease around wealthy, powerful people."

Both sides of Harris' family were upper-class political figures in their respective countries, with money and power. Harris' father was a professor of economics at Stanford University who served as an adviser to multiple Jamaican prime ministers.

Both of Harris' parents were far leftists who, in the early 1960s, were active in the Berkeley-based Afro-American Association (AAA), which, according to one former member, consisted of many people who looked to "Fidel Castro and Che Guevara" as their "heroes." "We would talk about Black Muslims, the liberation movements going on in Africa, everything," this member recalls. AAA leader Donald Warden mentored two of the group's members, Huey Newton and Bobby Seale, who in 1966 would collaborate to establish the Black Panther Party. Years thereafter, Warden who by then had changed his name to Khalid al-Mansour — would use his influence to help Barack Obama gain admission to Harvard Law School.

The blogger/author/documentarian Trevor Loudon also lays out the facts about the radical ties of Harris' sister, Maya:

"Harris' sister Maya Harris was a student activist at Stanford University. She was a friend of Steve Phillips, one of the leading Marxist-Leninists on campus and a longtime affiliate of a pro-China group League of Revolutionary Struggle. According to Phillips' blog, Political Intelligence: 'First, let me make clear that I come out of the Left. I've studied Marx, Mao, and Lenin. In college, I organized

solidarity efforts for freedom struggles in South Africa and Nicaragua, and I palled around with folks who considered themselves communists and revolutionaries ..., and I did my research paper on the Black Panther Party."

"After leaving Stanford in the early 1990s, Phillips led many of his comrades into the Democratic Party. He also married into the multi-billion Sandler family Golden West savings and loan fortune, which enabled the young revolutionary to buy himself considerable political influence.... In 2008, Phillips spent \$10 million through his PowerPAC-plus on voter registration drives in Southern and South Western states that got his friend Barack Obama ahead of Hillary Clinton in the Democratic primary. In 2013, Phillips helped elect his old Stanford friend Cory Booker to the U.S. Senate from New Jersey. In 2018, he almost made his proteges Stacey Abrams and Andrew Gillum the governors of Georgia and Florida, respectively.

"Phillips is a friend of the Harris family and helped Maya Harris' husband Tony West become associate attorney general in the Obama administration. He has also been a major sponsor of Kamala Harris' political career. In 2003, Phillips helped elect Harris as San Francisco district attorney.... Phillips' PowerPAC-plus helped elect Harris as California attorney general in 2010 and then to the U.S. Senate in 2016."

Harris moved to Montreal in 1976, after her parents separated; her mother was hired to teach at McGill University and to conduct research at the Jewish General Hospital. Kamala returned to the United States after graduating from the exclusive Westmount High School, located in one of Montreal's wealthiest suburbs.

Harris' husband, Doug Emhoff, is an attorney with the law firm DLA Piper, which, according to Natalie Winters in the *National Pulse*, "boasts nearly 30 years of experience in China and over 140 lawyers dedicated to its 'China Investment Services' branch." Adds Winters:

"To facilitate DLA Piper's China practice—which has received countless prestigious awards from the *China Business Law Journal* and *China Law and Practice*—the company employs a host of former Chinese Communist Party officials.

"Ernest Yang, who serves as the firm's Head of Litigation & Regulatory department and Co-Head of International Arbitration, was appointed to the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference (CPPCC) in 2013. The CPPCC serves as the top advisory board for

Politico Frets About Vance's 'Weird View on Gender' Normal Is the New Weird

Fresh on the heels of *Politico's* fear-mongering article warning about the ominous Christian influence of Lord of the Rings genius JRR Tolkien on Trump VP pick JD Vance, the outlet now devotes space to a profile of Vance's "weird views on gender." And by "weird," Politico means "normal" - the traditional, biologically based understanding of sex and family that has held for all but the last ten minutes or so of human history.

In an opinion piece titled, "JD Vance Has a Bunch of Weird Views on Gender," Politico's Laura K. Field begins by calling Vance "a rabid participant in the culture wars" - that's a dog whistle to leftists that Vance threatens the cultural hegemony the Left spent over half a century establishing precisely because the culture is where the real ideological war is waged and won. Conservative politicians like Vance and, say, Ron DeSantis, who understand this and are willing to get in the trenches of that fight, terrify the Left.

Politico's Field then takes exception to a comment Vance once made to then-Fox News host Tucker Carlson that "We are effectively run in the country, via the Democrats, via our corporate oligarchs, by a bunch of childless cat ladies who are miserable at their own lives and the choices that they've made,

and so they want to make the rest of the country miserable, too." Vance named Kamala Harris, Pete Buttigieg, and Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez as examples.

Is he wrong about that characterization? No. Leftists are antifamily Karens driven by a deep hatred of the bourgeois values of their political opponents: life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. Nothing brings them greater satisfaction than to impose their own miserable worldview on others by curtailing those values.

Field goes on to describe Vance "and the rest of the New Right" as sharing "a deep skepticism about modern feminism and gender equality" and an "[o]vert chauvinism that seeks to roll back much of feminism's gains." Well, bravo for him then, because modern feminism and gender ideology are the tip of the spear of the cultural Marxist subversion of Western civilization (change my mind). What Field and Politico laughably call "feminism's gains" have been disastrous for America (more on that below); we can't roll them back fast enough.

The article does concede that Vance, a father of three whose wife is an Indian legal immigrant, "appears to be a decent family man — someone who supports traditional conservative values." But it claims "his thoughts on women and gender reveal some unusual opinions that lie outside American mainstream,"

including opposition to abortion and same-sex marriage. Those may be minority positions now, thanks to the degrading influence of the Left and the moral weakness of the Republican Party, but they were not "unusual" until very recently. Remember how Barack Obama only came around to embracing same-sex marriage in time for his re-election campaign?

Field goes on to try in vain to damn Vance by association with "postliberal," "New Right" figures and institutions she finds very ominous, like Regime Change author Patrick Deneen or the Claremont Institute. She cites a 2021 speech of his for Claremont's Center for the American Way of Life in which Vance stated, "I think that we should fight for the right of every American to live a good life in the country they call their own, to raise a family and dignity on a single middleclass job." Every single word of that normal goal is like a stake through radical leftist hearts.

Then Field tries to connect Vance to the "musings of far-right extremists" like former American Enterprise Institute president Chris DeMuth, who opened a National Conservatism conference earlier this month by declaring, "A revival of faith, family, and fertility are not far right; they are the new mainstream!" The fact that Politico finds faith, family, and fertility to be threatening, "far-right" values speaks volumes about the Left, none of it good.

Field also cites a 2022 Vanity Fair interview in which Vance said his vision for the country "will mean that my son grows up in a world where his masculinity — his support of his family and his community, his love of his community is more important than whether it works for f g McKinsey." The Left bears a visceral hatred of traditional masculinity, so of course Field finds the thought of an America in which masculinity is valued repugnant.

In all fairness, Politico isn't the only left-wing outlet to demonize Vance's normal views on sex and family. MSNBC, to name just one more, predictably smeared him (and by extension, all normals) as holding "a host of bizarre, ultraconservative views on gender." Of course, they're not bizarre or ultraconservative at all; they're normal.

Politico concludes by warning Trump supporters that his VP choice is going to be a barrier to picking up more women voters: "While Trump's sexism has manifested as a crude machismo, Vance, along with his New Right fellow-travelers, is about to introduce voters to a more conceptual take on sexism — one which many women, and indeed many men, might find even more alarming."

Politico believes Vance's brand of "sexism" is alarming not because it is sexist but because it is normal. Nowhere in the article does Politico acknowledge that calls for faith, family and fertility resonate

Why The 2nd Amendment Is More Crucial Than Ever After Attempt to Kill Trump

20-year-old man with a rifle, perched Autop a nearby roof, fired several rounds July 13th at Donald Trump as the former president spoke at a campaign rally in Butler, Pennsylvania, killing one attendee and wounding at least two others.

As we know now, one round nicked Trump's right ear and he avoided a serious wound or death with a fortuitous head turn that moved him out of the bullet's path at the last second.

Almost immediately, some gun control activists saw the attempted assassination as an opportunity to call for their wish list of more restrictions on the constitutional right to keep and bear arms.

Talk about missing the point.

If the government can't protect the former (and possibly future) president of the United States from a single, highly motivated amateur bent on violence, it certainly can't protect ordinary Americans from every potential threat at all times and in all places. Nor should we want to live in a police state that is remotely capable of offering such assurances of our physical safety.

Highlighting the fact that no one—not even Donald Trump—is ever truly safe from violent threats to life, liberty, and property doesn't simultaneously highlight a need for more gun control.

Arguably, for those of us without professional security details, it underscores the importance of the Second Amendment's fundamental purpose—not hunting or sport shooting, but the unalienable right to self-defense.

Ordinary, peaceable Americans rely on their right to keep and bear arms to protect themselves and their loved ones from criminals and crime far more often than many others realize.

Almost every major study has found that Americans use their firearms in self-defense between 500,000 and 3 million times annually, according to a 2013 report by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention In 2021, the most comprehensive study ever conducted on the issue concluded that roughly 1.6 million defensive gun uses occur in the United States every year.

For this reason, The Daily Signal publishes a monthly article highlighting some of the previous month's many news stories

on defensive gun use that you may have missed—or that might not have made it to the national spotlight in the first place. (Read other accounts I covered at www. heritage.org [in] past years.)

The 12 examples below represent only a small portion of the news stories on defensive gun use that we found in June. You may explore more using The Heritage Foundation's interactive Defensive Gun Use Database.

- June 1, Ormond Beach, Florida: When a couple parked at a gas station were getting out of their car to use the restrooms, a woman pushed the driver out of the way, got into the driver's seat, and tried to steal the car, police said. An armed bystander saw what was happening and intervened, drawing his gun on the woman and prompting her to stop. Police arrested the woman, who was held without bond.
- June 2, Stanton, California: An armed ride-share driver was dropping off a passenger when he saw a naked man violently assaulting a much older woman, police said. The driver quickly tried to intervene by firing a warning shot, but the naked assailant charged at the car and "hit the glass repeatedly." The driver shot the assailant, critically wounding him.
- June 5, Lufkin, Texas: Within an hour of being released from jail after an arrest for domestic violence, a man tried to steal a truck in which a mother and young child were sitting, police said. The woman's husband, who owns the truck, drew his weapon on the man but tried to de-escalate the situation by offering him a different vehicle. The man instead began to fight the truck owner, who fatally shot him.
- June 9, Plainfield, Illinois: When a woman's ex-boyfriend broke into her home, two juveniles inside tried to barricade themselves in a bedroom, police said. The intruder followed them and kicked down the bedroom door, prompting one of the minors to get a firearm and hold the intruder at gunpoint until police arrived. The suspect faced numerous charges, including possession of a controlled substance after investigators said he dropped a bag of cocaine while breaking in.
- June 12, Henderson, Nevada: Police said a man in a Walmart parking lot fatally shot an armed assailant in selfdefense after the assailant approached his vehicle "with a firearm in a confrontational manner."

- June 15, Plainfield, Michigan: Police said a homeowner awoke to screams from his daughter's bedroom and found an intoxicated intruder-sans pantsstabbing his daughter's 11-year-old friend, who was there for a sleepover. The homeowner held the intruder at gunpoint until police arrived and arrested him. The intruder later told officers that he planned to kill everyone there and have sex with the body of the 11-year-
- June 17, Uniontown, Pennsylvania: An assailant with an illegally possessed gun shot and wounded someone. The victim, also armed, returned fire in selfdefense, hitting the assailant once in the leg. Police said the victim wouldn't be charged with a crime.
- June 20, D'Iberville, Mississippi: An armed resident fatally shot a man who drove to his home and threatened him with a gun. The dead man had a history of threatening the resident, police said. Investigators said they believe that on the way to the resident's home, he shot at another driver. Neither the resident nor the victim of the road rage shooting
- June 23, East Klamath County, Oregon: A local sheriff's office publicly thanked an armed citizen for helping to detain one of two suspected car thieves who fled in the car after deputies interrupted them as they committed a burglary. "Often it is the eyes, ears, and actions of neighbors that make the difference, especially in rural areas," the sheriff's office said in a press release. "While the sheriff's office would never request someone put themselves in harm's way, in this case, the citizen's efforts are greatly appreciated." The arrested suspect faced a slew of criminal charges.
- June 26, Alliance, Nebraska: An armed homeowner fatally shot an intruder who local police say had a history of burglary. Police determined that the evidence at the scene was consistent with the homeowner's account and didn't recommend charges against him.
- June 29, Louisville, Kentucky: Two armed men tried to rob a gaming store at gunpoint but were thwarted by an armed customer who was walking by, saw the robbery in progress, and shot both robbers—one fatally. Neither of two employees in the store was hurt, nor was the armed customer, apparently.

The manager of a nearby business told reporters that this was at least the fourth time that robbers had targeted the gaming store.

June 30, Martinsburg, West Virginia: Police said a woman watched as her godson was physically assaulted and then threatened with a gun by two individuals while he was taking out the trash. She grabbed her gun and went to the door, at which point one of the two began shooting at her. The woman returned fire in self-defense, police said. Unfortunately, she was fighting an eviction notice even though the rental office agreed she acted in self-defense and the sheriff's department publicly announced that her actions "likely prevented injury, loss of life, or further damage."

As these stories demonstrate, the Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms isn't some dangerous and outdated relic that undermines public safety.

It is, rather, one of the best tools ordinary Americans have when faced with violent threats to their unalienable rights.

The attempted assassination of Trump should cause the nation to reevaluate plenty of things and give many an opportunity to pause for a moment of self-reflection.

But in no world should it lead us to reevaluate the Second Amendment.

And in no way ought that self-reflection lead us to hamstring our right to an armed defense.



Anti-Gunners Can't Get Enough of Ammo Vending Machines

The gun control lobby may not have a financial interest in American Rounds' Automated Ammo Retail System, but gun control activists are most definitely emotionally invested in the ammunition vending machines that are in operation in a handful of grocery stores around the country. In fact, if I were more conspiratorially minded, I might think that groups like Giffords and Everytown are silent partners with American Rounds given all the free press that the groups have generated for the company.

The latest earned media for American Rounds comes from Alabama public radio affiliate WBHM which spoke to several gun control activists about the company's machines, which are in operation in four Fresh Value grocery stores around the state.

"The thing that is shocking is that our federal laws with respect to ammunition sales are so weak in this country that something like this is possible," said David Pacino, the legal director for Giffords Law Center to Prevent Gun Violence.

That's the organization former Arizona Congressperson Gabby Giffords formed after she and 18 other people were shot in 2011. Pacino added, with a vending machine, there's virtually no way to stop someone prohibited from purchasing ammo from doing so, as long as they are of legal age.

"While it's illegal for people with certain criminal histories or other disqualifying facts to buy ammunition, there's no check to make sure that

them," Pacino said.

In most states, a store clerk selling ammo has the responsibility to stop a sale in certain situations. For instance, if a person is inebriated or seems mentally unstable.

"If you have a human being who is on the other side of that sale, they can have a responsibility and do have the responsibility to make sure at least some of the most egregious forms of misconduct, or the most egregious red flags, aren't being met," Pacino said.

And if someone is sloppy drunk or acting deranged in a grocery store, one of the humans who work there is probably going to call police, whether they're purchasing ammo for a vending machine or Ajax from the household goods aisle.

While Giffords' David Pucino (yep, the NPR affiliate couldn't even get his name right) just wants to see the ammo vending machines shut down, his colleague at Everytown sees an upside in the machines.

Nick Suplina is the senior vice president for law and policy at Everytown for Gun Safety. He liked the technology American Rounds is using, just not on a vending machine.

"Innovations that make ammunition sales more secure, like facial recognition, age verification or potentially tracking serial sales are promising safety measures, but they belong in gun stores, not in the place where you buy your kids milk," Suplina said.

I guess Suplina is unaware of the fact ners-cant-get-enough-of-vending-amthat you can purchase ammo at Walmart, mo-machines-n1225719

somebody is prohibited, doesn't buy right along with your milk (and cookies too, if you're in the mood). Heck, my local feed store offers everything from scratch grains to nightcrawlers to 12-gauge shotgun shells, and one of my local gas stations has a pretty decent selection of ammunition for sale along with standard convenience store items like soda and candy.

> There's nothing new or particularly unusual about ammo being sold in places other than gun stores, at least in rural America. What's different about American Rounds is the automated process... and the full-throated freakout by gun control activists, which has only helped the popularity of the vending machines.

> The manager of the Pell City, Alabama Fresh Value store even told WBHM that the machine in his story's lobby wasn't getting a lot of use until the media and gun control groups discovered its existence, but "since the publicity, people are picking it up now."

> American Rounds CEO Grant Magers should write some "thank you" letters to Pucino and Suplina, along with Brady head Kris Brown, who's also melted down over the vending machines. Their outrage is the best press that Magers could hope for, and he didn't have to spend a penny to generate buzz from coast-to-coast.

the Chinese Comunist Party, and Yang was promoted to the body's Standing Committee in 2019.

"Jessica Zhao, a Senior Advisor, served as the Deputy Secretary-General of the China International Economic and Trade Arbitration Commission (CIETAC), a government-owned body established by the Chinese Communist Party in 1956. It was developed under the auspices of the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade, 'a governmental body for the furtherance of Chinese trade promotion."

Several other high-level employees of DLA Piper have served the Chinese regime in various capacities.

Kamala Harris earned a B.A. from Howard University in 1986 and a JD from the UC Hastings College of Law in 1989. During her student years, she organized mentor programs for nonwhite minorities, demonstrated against South African apartheid, and pledged a black sorority named Alpha Kappa Alpha, which was engaged in social

After graduating from law school, Harris spent the next quarter-century serving variously as: Deputy District Attorney for Alameda County from 1990-98; Managing Attorney of the Career Criminal Unit of the San Francisco District Attorney's Office from 1998-2000; head of the San Francisco City Attorney's Division on Families and Children from 2000-03; San Francisco's District Attorney from 2004-11; and Attorney General of California from 2011-17.

California State Assembly Speaker Willie Brown, Who Had Deep Communist Ties, Appoints Harris to **Key Positions**

In 1994 the 30-year-old Harris was dating 60-year-old Willie Brown, who at that time was the Democratic speaker of the California State Assembly, making him one of the most powerful politicians in the state. Brown had been separated but not divorced from his wife since the 1980s. In June of '94. Harris took a leave of absence from her job as a deputy prosecutor in Alameda County and was appointed by Brown to a \$97,000-per-year position with the California Unemployment Insurance Appeals Board (CUIAB).

Harris then resigned from that board five months later and was immediately appointed by Brown to a \$70,000-per-year job with the California Medical Assistance Commission (CMAC), a post she would hold until 1998. Harris had no medical background whatsoever when she joined the CMAC, which was noteworthy in light of the fact that Commission members were technically required to have experience

health-and-medical-related Moreover, all the other CMAC members were former state officials who were either nearing retirement or already semiretired, thus Harris was approximately three decades younger than anyone else on the Commission. According to former California Republican state assemblyman Brett Granlund: "Both boards [CUIAB and CMAC] are reserved for political payback or occasionally for personal rewards for personal service. The boards are considered plumb appointments as they require no work, no policy credentials, and are paid the equivalent of a full-time [state] senator for arriving at a one-to-two-hour meeting each month."

In October 2020, Trevor Loudon provided the following vital background information about Willie Brown's Communist ties: "Brown was a long-time communist sympathizer. He was first elected to public office with the help of the Communist Party USA youth wing. He was funded by Dr. Carlton Goodlett, a communist newspaper owner who was once awarded the Lenin Prize by the government of the former Soviet Union. Several years after his affair with Harris, Brown was still openly sponsoring Communist Party fundraisers in the Bay Area while serving as San Francisco mayor. Today, Brown is widely regarded as one of the Chinese Communist Party's best friends in the Bay Area."

Soft on Crime

During her tenure as San Francisco district attorney (2004-11), the number of prison terms per arrest in San Francisco were California's lowest — ten times lower than the corresponding rate in San Diego County.

Opposing the Death Penalty for a Gang Member Who Murdered a Police Officer

A few days after a San Francisco police officer named Isaac Espinoza was shot and killed by a gang member with an AK-47 assault rifle during a routine traffic stop in 2004, District Attorney Harris - who had campaigned for that office on a pledge that she would never pursue capital punishment for any criminal, because she considered it unjust and immoral – announced that she would not seek a death sentence for Officer Espinoza's killer. When Espinoza's family subsequently pleaded that she reconsider her position for this particular case, Harris said: "I approach the work of being a prosecutor as the responsibility to do justice. It's not about the responsibility to lock people up for the maximum amount of time. It is the responsibility to make sure the criminal justice system has integrity."

Ties to the Marxist-Leninist "Workers World Party" & ACORN

In the early 2000s, Harris' Chief of Staff, Karine Jean-Pierre, was active with the New York-based Haiti Support Network, which worked closely with the Marxist-Leninist Workers World Party and supported Jean-Bertrand Aristide, the far-left former president of Haiti. Jean-Pierre also worked on the re-election campaign of China-friendly New York

City Council member James Sanders. In that role, Jean-Pierre collaborated with the notoriously corrupt community organization ACORN.

Rejecting the Individual's Right to Gun Ownership

As San Francisco District Attorney in 2008, Harris filed an amicus brief with the U.S. Supreme Court in District of Columbia v. Heller. She argued that the Second Amendment does not protect an individual's right to own a gun.

Refusing to Defend Proposition 8, a California State Amendment **Supporting Traditional Marriage**

In 2008, Harris was disturbed when California voters approved Proposition 8, a constitutional amendment banning samesex marriage in that state. In December 2010, as she prepared to commence her tenure as California Attorney General, Harris announced that her AG office – in a departure from the custom whereby AGs traditionally defend state laws - would not defend Proposition 8 before the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals. The reason for Harris' refusal to defend Prop. 8, was that she personally disagreed with it. "It's well within the authority vested in me as the elected attorney general to use the discretion of my office to make decisions about how we will use our resources and what issue we will weigh in on or not," she said. When Proposition 8 eventually went before the U.S. Supreme Court in 2013, Harris stated: "I declined to defend Proposition 8 because it violates the Constitution. The Supreme Court has described marriage as a fundamental right 14 times since 1888. The time has come for this right to be afforded to every citizen."

When the Supreme Court decided in June 2015, to legalize same-sex marriage nationwide, Harris called it an "incredible day in history." "California is validated. We are validated," she said during a news conference in Sacramento. "Each day that one of those couples have to go without being able to have their marriage and their love legally recognized," Harris added, "... is one day too long." Harris also directed a message to Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia, who dissented from the decision and depicted California as a cultural outlier. "Don't hate the playa, hate the game," said Harris.

Refusal to Seek the Death Penalty for Illegal-Alien MS-13 Member & Triple Murderer

In 2009, Harris announced that she would seek life imprisonment, rather than capital punishment, against El Salvadoran illegal alien Edwin Ramos, an MS-13 gang member who in 2008 had murdered a father and two of his sons (while critically wounding a third son) in a drive-by shooting. Ramos, mistaking the victims for gang rivals, killed them when they were returning home from a family picnic.

Narrow Victory in Election for California Attorney General in 2010

In 2010, Harris narrowly defeated Los Angeles County district attorney Steve Cooley, a moderate Republican, in a race for California Attorney General. Her margin of victory was just 74,000 out of 8.8 million votes, or a margin of 0.8 percent. Cooley had been leading in her in most pre-election polls, and he actually declared victory on election night. But Harris eventually prevailed after all provisional and mail-in ballots were counted. She went on to serve as A.G. from 2011-2017.

Refusing to Sue a Professor Who Used Public University Website

to Promote the Anti-Semitic BDS Movement

In 2011, pro-Israel legal experts affiliated with the AMCHA Initiative, the Israel Law Center, and the Global Frontier Justice Center petitioned then-Attorney General Harris to sue David Klein, a California State University at Northridge (CSUN) mathematics professor who was a member of the U.S. Campaign for the Academic and Cultural Boycott of Israel, and who served as the faculty adviser to CSUN's chapter of Students for Justice in Palestine. Specifically, the three pro-Israel groups charged that Klein was using his publicly funded, university-provided website to promote the Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) movement, a pro-Hamas initiative, in violation of laws prohibiting taxpayer dollars from being used to finance non-business-related endeavors. But Harris rejected all efforts to persuade her to bring charges against Klein. When the pro-Israel groups tried again, in 2012, to push Harris to take action against the professor, Harris said there was insufficient evidence upon which to base a lawsuit. AMCHA cofounder and director Tammi Benjamin described Harris' response to AMCHA's overtures as "very curt and short."

Allowing California Law-Enforcement Agencies to Ignore ICE Detainers for **Deportation of Criminal Aliens**

On December 4, 2012, Attorney General Harris issued a memo informing all the executives of California's state and local law-enforcement agencies that they could "make their own decisions about whether to fulfill" Immigration & Customs Enforcement detainers – i.e., temporary holds that federal immigration authorities may place on municipal prisoners who are suspected of being eligible for deportation.

Refusal to Oppose Ballot Measure That Would Result in the Release of **Thousands of Prisoners**

In 2014, Attorney General Harris refused to take a position either for or against Proposition 47, a ballot measure that would reduce several felony offenses to misdemeanors, and would thereby result in thousands of prisoners being released. Though Prop 47 was opposed by every professional law-enforcement organization in California, and by 55 of the state's 58 county district attorneys, the measure was passed by voters.

Supporting Taxpayer-Funded Sex-**Change Operations for Prison Inmates**

In 2014 as well, Harris agreed to a settlement with Rodney Quine, a transgender prisoner who was serving a life sentence for murder without possibility of parole. The settlement — which came after Quine's attorneys had argued that a denial of their client's desire to change his genitalia would violate the Eighth Amendment's ban on "cruel and unusual punishment" - permitted the prisoner to undergo a costly sex-change operation at taxpayer expense. Harris called the settlement "an important step forward in the ongoing effort to protect transgender rights in California."

Chambered in 380 Auto, the pistol ships with a flush fit 10-round magazine and an extended 12-round magazine giving the user substantially more capacity, and models will be available with or without a thumb safety. The Bodyguard 2.0 has an overall height of 4-inches, a width just under 1-inch, and weighs in at 9.8 oz unloaded, which provides the user a more comfortable



fit and improved control. It also includes a striker-fired design and new flat-face trigger for better consistency for more accurate shots. Out of the box, the pistol ships with a black u-notch rear sight, and a bright tritium-insert front sight, that allows the user to rapidly acquire and stay on target.


